Subject: Orders to foreign expeditionary shore service.

1. Proceed on the 23rd instant on aviation duty to New York, N.Y., report to the Disbursing Officer, Third Naval District, 280 Broadway, for transportation to a port in Europe, for temporary duty with the U.S. Naval Air Service in France, reporting to the Commanding Officer, Headquarters, U.S. Naval Air Service, Paris.
2. You will request the pay officer procuring your transportation to inform the Major General Commandant, by means of a coded dispatch, of the name of the vessel on which you will take passage and the date of sailing. This information should be furnished as soon as you have sailed.
3. Upon arrival at Liverpool, England, you will report to the American Consul for transportation to your destination, provided transportation has not otherwise been arranged.
4. Upon the arrival of the First Marine Aviation Force in France, you will report to the Commanding Officer and resume duty with that organization.
5. Forward by special delivery immediately to the Identification Section, Bureau of Navigation, Navy Department, your photograph (unmounted, 3x3) in uniform, age in years and months, height in feet and inches, weight, color of eyes and hair, and complexion, for an identification certificate. It is absolutely necessary that you have this certificate before sailing.
