#### **Recommendation:**

Recommendation by Recreation that Council authorize the issuance and/or execution of a Purchase Order to All Power Generators, corp., utilizing Miami Dade County, under contract # FB-00418 (attached), in an amount not to exceed \$14,212.50, for a new Vortec Engine for the generator at the Aquatic Center as funds were budgeted in the FY21/22 Budget pursuant to Section §31.11 (E)(5) of the City Code.

#### **Discussion:**

The generator is very important to our operation. If we happen to lose power at the facility, not having a generator could cause our pumps not to work and this would shut down our Aquatic Center operation immediately. This will cause various issues with our pumps and filtration systems. The longer we don't have power at the Aquatic Center the more difficult it is to get the pool back up and operational where it is safe for our pool patrons to use. We have attached the specifications for the new engine, it's a 50KW Chevy Vortec 5.7L.

## RESOLUTION NO. 2022-

A RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MIAMI SPRINGS, FLORIDA, APROVING THE PURCHASE AND INSTALLATION OF A REPLACEMENT GENERATOR MOTOR FOR THE CITY'S AQUATIC CENTER FROM ALL POWER GENERATORS CORP. IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$14,213 UTILIZING THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY CONTRACT NO. FC-00418 PURSUANT TO SECTIONS 31-11(C)(2) AND 31-11(E)(5) OF THE CITY DECLARING CERTAIN EQUIPMENT AS SURPLUS PROPERTY: AUTHORIZING THE SALE OR DISPOSITION OF SURPLUS PROPERTY; **PROVIDING FOR** IMPLEMENTATION; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

**WHEREAS**, the City of Miami Springs (the "City") seeks to purchase and install a motor for the generator at the Aquatic Center (the "Equipment") to replace an existing generator motor that has reached the end of its useful lifecycle; and

**WHEREAS,** in accordance with Section 31-11(C)(2) of the City's Code of Ordinances (the "Code"), the City requested three quotes to purchase and install the Equipment, anticipating that the good faith estimate total cost would not exceed \$25,000; and

**WHEREAS,** the type of purchase contemplated by the City has been competitively bid by Miami-Dade County, which has entered into Contract No. FC-00418 (the "County Contract") with All Power Generators Corp. (the "Contractor"); and

WHEREAS, the Contractor has provided the City with a quote, consistent with the terms of the County Contract, for the purchase and installation of the Equipment in an amount not to exceed \$14,213, which Quote is attached hereto as Exhibit "A" (the "Quote"); and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Sections 31-11(C)(2) and 31-11(E)(5) of the City's Code of Ordinances, the City Council seeks to approve the purchase and installation of the Equipment in an amount not to exceed \$14,213, consistent with the County Contract and the Contractor's Quote, as the pricing offered by Contractor pursuant to the County Contract is in the City's best interest; and

WHEREAS, the City Council declares the Equipment listed on Exhibit "B" attached hereto (the "Surplus Equipment") as surplus property as the Surplus Equipment has become obsolete, outlived its usefulness, become inadequate for the public purposes for which it was intended, or is no longer needed for public purposes in light of the purchase authorized by this Resolution, and authorizes the City Manager to sell or otherwise dispose of the Surplus Equipment; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that this Resolution is in the best interest and welfare of the residents of the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MIAMI SPRINGS, FLORIDA, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Recitals. That the above recitals are confirmed, adopted, and incorporated herein and made a part hereof by reference.

**Section 2.** Approval. That pursuant to Sections 31-11(C)(2) and 31-11(E)(5) of the City Code, the City Council hereby approves the purchase and installation of the Equipment in an amount not to exceed \$14,213, consistent with the County Contract and the Contractor's Quote attached hereto as Exhibit "A."

**Declaration of Surplus Property.** That the Surplus Equipment has Section 3. become obsolete, outlived its usefulness, become inadequate for the public purposes for which it was intended, or is no longer needed for public purposes. Accordingly, the City Council declares the Surplus Equipment listed on Exhibit "B" attached hereto to be surplus personal property of the City.

Section 4. Authorizing Sale or Disposition of Surplus Property. That the City Manager is hereby authorized to sell or dispose of the Surplus Equipment by public auction or other procedure determined by the City Manager to be in the best interests of the City. Any surplus property items acquired by the City pursuant to governmental grant programs shall only be disposed of in accordance with procedures and criteria applicable to such grant programs.

Section 5. **Implementation.** That the City Manager is authorized to execute any purchase order or required documentation for the purchase described in this Resolution, subject to approval by the City Attorney as to form and legality, and to take any action that is reasonably necessary to implement the purpose of this Resolution.

1) Contract Instructions (Re: ITB Paragraph 2.3.1)

Vendors pre-qualified will participate in spot market purchases as required by the County on either an as-needed or on a periodic basis. When such spot market purchases are initiated, the pre-qualified vendors shall be invited to offer a fixed price for a specific individual purchase, or a specific purchasing period. The vendor then offering the lowest fixed price shall be awarded for the specific period or specific purchase. A Micro/SBE bidder must be certified by the Sustainability, Planning and Economic Enhancement Department. For contracts valued over \$1 million, an SBE Preference of 5% is applied to a SBEs offer (for the purpose of evaluation ONLY). For contracts valued up to \$1 million, an SBE Preference of 10% is applied (for the purpose of evaluation ONLY). If the SBE is the responsible, responsive low bidder following the evaluation process, the price that the county will pay the awarded firm is the original price offered (excluding the 5% or 10% evaluation factors).

Local preference should be applied in accordance with Section 2-8.5 of the Miami Dade County Code (http://library.municode.com/index.aspx?clientId=10620&stateId=9&stateName=Florida) at the time user departments request quotations from the pre-qualified bidders. When a responsive bid from a Miami-Dade local business is within 10% of the lowest price submitted by a responsive non-local business, the local business and the non-local low bidder shall have the opportunity to submit a best and final (BAFO) bid equal to or lower than the amount of the low bid previously submitted by the non-local business.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

Recommendation that Council authorize the issuance of a work order to the City's engineers, Bermello, Ajamil and Partners, Inc. (B&A), for Phase 2 of the Oakwood Drive (A) and East Drive (B) Stormwater & Roadway Improvements, consistent with B&A's existing agreement with the City and the proposal attached hereto as Exhibit "A", in an amount not to exceed \$276,930.00 for meetings, FDEP coordination, geotechnical, 100% construction design and permitting. Phase 1 A&B for the Oakwood Drive and East Drive Stormwater Improvement Projects were previously approved by Council on April 26<sup>th</sup>, 2021 in the amount of \$69, 916.00 for Oakwood Drive and on August 9<sup>th</sup>, 2021 in the amount of \$92,248.00 for East Drive.

#### DISCUSSION:

On April 26<sup>th</sup>, 2021, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2021-3911 approving the issuance of a work order to B&A for Phase 1A of the Oakwood Drive Stormwater Improvements project, in an amount of \$69,916, consisting of surveying and preliminary engineering report to address flooding issues in the area south of Stafford Park, Oakwood Drive from East Drive to Kenmore Drive and Kenmore Drive (north) to the C-6 Miami Canal (the "Project Area").

On August 9<sup>th</sup>, 2021, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2021-3926 approving the issuance of a work order to B&A for Phase 1B of the East Drive Stormwater Improvements project, in an amount of \$92,248.00, consisting of surveying and preliminary engineering, stormwater management plan and conceptual landscape design to address flooding issues, traffic calming with a roundabout in the intersection of East Drive and Oakwood Drive and roadway beautification all along East Drive from South Royal Poinciana Boulevard to NW 36<sup>th</sup> Street (the "Project Area").

City Council's approval will be required in the future for both the final project phase 3 (bidding and construction management support) and for award of a construction contract after issuance of an Invitation to Bid (ITB) once Phase 2 is closer to completion sometime in July 2022.

The Project costs will be reimbursed and funded through the \$1 Million State legislative appropriation from FY21-22 approved by Council on August 9<sup>th</sup>, 2021 via Resolution No. 2021-3929.

#### FISCAL IMPACT:

Funding for Phase 2 of the Project will come from the \$1 Million dollar state appropriation for this project.

January 19, 2022 SCOPE OF SERVICES WORK AUTHORIZATION – Phase 2 City of Miami Springs East Drive Stormwater and Roadway improvements

#### INTRODUCTION

The City of Miami Springs (City) owns, operates, and maintains a stormwater management system within its service area in accordance with the FDEP grant. The drainage system consists of a catch basin and pipeline network that conveys water by gravity towards the C6 drainage canal, which is managed by the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD). The drainage area along Oakwood drive, south of Stafford Park has been designated high priority due to constant flooding. Localized conditions worsen this situation: 1. the groundwater table elevation in the area remains high throughout the year, and 2. SFWMD keeps the C-6 canal stages elevated enough to provide little to no head for stormwater to drain by gravity. The area is approximately 0.1 square miles, as indicated in the Project Area section.

In addition to the stormwater improvements along Oakwood drive, BA shall provide design services including drawings and calculations for the drainage, roadway improvements and beautification of East Drive from NW 36<sup>th</sup> Street on the south to South Royal Poinciana Blvd. on the north. The design shall be consistent with standards established by the City of Miami Springs and Miami-Dade regulations. Based on recommendations and approvals by the City of Miami Springs completed under Phase 1, BA shall provide design, specifications and drawings for the redevelopment of this corridor to accommodate pedestrian, bicycle and vehicular activity including a roundabout at the intersection of East Drive and Oakwood Drive, as well as provide final calculations and permits as required for stormwater management and landscape improvements along this corridor.

#### **PROJECT AREA**

Stormwater improvements

As noted in Figure 1, the project area consists of the South portion of Stafford Park, Oakwood Drive from East Drive to Kenmore and Kenmore Dr. N to the C-6 Miami Canal.

# Roadway Improvements/ East Drive Beautification

The project boundaries are delineated by the ROW of East Drive from NW 36<sup>th</sup> Street to Royal South Poinciana Blvd, approximately 2,900 Lin. Ft. in length.

#### **OBJECTIVE**

The main objective of this SOW is to prepare the design, specifications and permitting for roadway and drainage improvements along Oakwood Drive, Stafford Park and East Drive corridor. This project will address flooding issues and landscape beautification in the area in accordance with FDEP and City of Miami Springs standards. The project shall consider the conveyance of runoff generated in the project area and the installation of a new stormwater pump

station, piping and outfall to the C6 canal, as an alternative to solve the minimal head availability that the project area is currently experiencing and provide landscape beautification to the East Drive corridor.

#### SCOPE OF WORK

The City has requested Bermello Ajamil and Partners (BA) to provide professional engineering services for the **East Drive Roadway Improvements Project** under their current CCNA continuing services agreement with the City. This SOW has been prepared in accordance with City recommendations that were discussed during a meeting, site visit and inspection with City and BA staff on March 26, 2021 and were separated into three phases:

#### WORK BREAKDOWN SCHEDULE

# Task 2.1 – Meetings and FDEP Coordination

BA shall schedule and participate in periodic meetings and/or teleconference calls with the City and FDEP staff to discuss project schedule, major milestones and review pertinent available data. BA shall also coordinate with FDEP project management and provide all forms and project updates, as required by the FDEP grant protocol.

#### Task 2.2 – Subsurface Utility Engineering (SUE)

BA shall subcontract and perform up to 10 soft dig/test holes to verify the size, depth, type of material, and horizontal location of existing utilities that may be along the pipeline corridor (within the topographic survey limits), which may affect the design of the drainage improvements.

#### Task 2.3 – Geotechnical

BA shall subcontract and perform six (6) soil borings tests to a depth of 15 feet for utilities, borehole percolation tests at depths of 15 feet for use in drainage calculations along East Drive and Stafford Park, and a soil boring tests at a depth of

30' for foundations for the pump station. Subconsultant shall inspect all samples, set up appropriate laboratory tests, perform appropriate analysis and prepare a report of recommendations for the purpose of documenting subsurface conditions encountered. The geotechnical report will include test boring location plan as well as graphic logs of the soil test borings and results of laboratory test as performed.

#### **Deliverables:**

• Geotechnical report including test boring location plan as well as graphic logs of the soil test borings and results of laboratory test as performed – one (1) hard copy, and an electronic copy.

# Task 2.4 - Design Development

The Design Development Task will be divided into Subtasks for the Stormwater Design, the Landscape Beatification of East Drive, and the design of the roundabout as follows:

# Subtask 2.4.1; Stormater Design for Oakwood Drive and East Drive

Under this task, BA will prepare an update for Phase 1: Conceptual Engineering Report as noted below:

- a. Advance preliminary stormwater management plans from 30% to 60%
- b. Advance 60% stormwater management plans from 60% to 90% following review and comment from City and other applicable government agencies

- d. Final Opinion of Construction Costs
- e. All required coordination with applicable government agencies in preparation of the DDs (60%) and CDs (90%)

# Subtask 2.4.2. – East Drive Improvements Design

BA shall prepare a set of signed and sealed landscape drawing at 60% and 90% and specifications provided in the Issue for Bidding Submittal incorporating any changes that may result from addendums issued during the Design Development step.

#### **Deliverables:**

Under this task, BA shall submit the following deliverables to the City of Miami Springs:

- 60% design drawings (24" X 36") five (5) hard copies
- 90% design documents (24" X 36") five (5) hard copies

## Subtask 2.4.3 – Design Roundabout

BA shall subcontract with a traffic engineer and coordinate with MD Traffic Department and the City of Miami Springs for the design, permitting, and drawings for a roundabout at the intersection of Oakwood Drive and East Drive as discussed in Phase 1, Conceptual Design. Under this task, BA and subconsultant shall prepare the design plans for review and approval by the City of Miami Springs and permits by MD regulatory agencies.

#### **Deliverables:**

Deliverables under this task include:

- Pre-application meetings, roundabout geometric assessment, and traffic study, if needed
- Preliminary 60% and 90% drawings.

# Task 2.5 – Permitting and construction documents

Under this task, BA shall coordinate with each of the regulatory agencies having jurisdiction over the project to confirm the agency's design criteria at 60 percent; and after the 90% permit package submittal is completed, agencies with jurisdiction and required permits may include the following:

Establish a level playing field for traditional public schools by extending the current statutory flexibility such as the exemption from State Education Required Facilities (SREF), categorical funding, accountability, class size reduction compliance and related penalties assessed on charter schools.

Support capital funding for charter schools that:

- Creates neither a reduction of funding to traditional public schools in operating or capital funding nor a requirement for additional taxing mandate on the local school district;
- Requires public input; and
- Protects taxpayers' investment ensuring that capital funding be spent only on assets that can be returned to the public school district.

Require charter schools that receive capital outlay funding to serve as hurricane evacuation shelters.

Support legislation that promotes transparent student recruitment strategies, application processes and enrollment lotteries, and supports enrollment equity of educationally disadvantaged students and underserved/underrepresented students.

Allow school districts with at least 15 percent of total student enrollment in charter schools to analyze the need for additional charter schools and/or require new charters to locate in areas to address overcrowding, provide choice opportunities to students/parents zoned to failing schools, or meet a specific academic need the school district is not addressing.

Support legislation that:

- prohibits applicants with existing charter schools under academic or financial corrective action plans, investigation, or some other kind of sanction to apply for an additional charter schools;
- strengthens accountability, protects taxpayers' investment and ensures compliance with charter school fiduciary responsibilities; and
- requires charter schools that have been in operation for less than five years and/or in financial distress to place funds in an escrow account to cover expenditures associated with closure such as final audits, legal fees, corporate dissolution, asset retrieval, bankruptcy fines, and the value of at least one payroll payment.

Protect taxpayers' interest by attaching a proprietary interest equal to the value of the allocation from the local discretionary capital outlay levy revenue provided to charter schools, and prohibit charter operators from personal enrichment from public funds.

#### **CHOICE**

Support increased accountability measures for all publicly-funded school choice options.

Oppose all publicly funded programs that lack equitable and sufficient accountability measures.

Require more accountability from schools receiving Family Empower Scholarship (FES) funding.

Amend the Hope Scholarships to apply only to "substantiated" incidents of harassment, bullying, and battery.

#### **ACADEMICS**

Oppose legislation that would limit offering gifted programs to eligible high school students.

Require the state to provide a minimum of one-year lead time on new state requirements for school districts.

Maintain the current dual delivery system of post-secondary programs.

Support adding the attainment of the Advanced Placement Capstone diploma as one of the eligibility requirements for Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program.

Support restoration of the "text book" supplement to the Bright Futures Scholarship Program.

Ensure charter and private schools receiving public monies adhere to the same teacher certification, student placement, and progression policies to ensure compliance with federal and state accountability requirements.

Reinstate personal finance/financial literacy standards in the 12th grade Economics course.

Support requiring health education to include human trafficking.

#### ACCOUNTABILITY AND ASSESSMENT

Revise the current accountability assessment system to:

- Provide a waiver from the passage of the English Language Arts (ELA) requirement for ELL students who
  have passed all other high school graduation requirements and have been enrolled in school less than two
  consecutive years;
- Include the performance of ELL students enrolled in school for more than two years for accountability on the Florida Standards Assessment (FSA); and
- Define goals for ELL and Exceptional Student Education (ESE) subgroups based on achieving learning gains on state assessments as opposed to achieving proficiency.

#### STUDENT SAFETY/WELLNESS

Support legislation that Increased penalties for firing a gun within 1,000 feet of a school and that establishes penalties for the unsupervised possession of a firearm by a minor.

Support legislation that prohibits the sale of e-cigarettes in misleading forms such as pens and USBs.

Support legislation and state funding to increase awareness of opioid drug use and its impact.

Support legislation that proposes a "slowing down zone" within an area prior to entering a school zone.

Support funding to provide training for students, parents, teachers, school administrators, counseling staff, and volunteers to learn how to recognize behaviors that lead to bullying and harassment.

Ensure any casino authorized in Florida is at least 1,000 feet from a school or land designated for school purpose.

Ensure that the sale of low-THC edibles is precluded within 1,000 feet of a school.

Support legislation that precludes a child victim or witness to a crime be subjected to a discovery deposition in any criminal court proceeding.

Support telemedicine legislation that facilitates effective and efficient use of technology to provide health services to schools minimizing the length of time students are out of school due to illness.

Support efforts to limit navigation apps from directing traffic to neighborhoods away from major highways or streets.

Support legislation that incorporates the instruction of the dangers and signs of human trafficking as part of health education and funding for the development of an awareness campaign to educate students and parents on the dangers and signs of human trafficking providing information concerning approaches used by traffickers, and behavior that should be reported to authorities.

Support full funding for required water safety and swimming instruction in public schools.

#### **WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT:**

Restore performance-based incentive funding for postsecondary CAPE Industry Credentials.

#### **PUBLIC MEETINGS**

Amend state statutes to clarify that meeting with legislators to advocate for the Board's legislative priorities is not a violation of the Sunshine.

### **RESOLUTION**

A RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MIAMI SPRINGS, FLORIDA, AUTHORIZING THE SUBMISSION OF A GRANT APPLICATION TO THE FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (FDOT) RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION SERVICES; AUTHORIZING THE ACCEPTANCE OF A GRANT AWARD FROM FDOT, IF AWARDED; AUTHORIZING THE PURCHASE OF VEHICLES AND/OR EQUIPMENT AND THE EXPENDITURE OF GRANT FUNDS PURSUANT TO A GRANT AWARD; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

### **RECOMMENDATION**

Staff recommends that the attached Resolution be adopted, authorizing the City Manager to submit a grant application to FDOT for the Project and execute any necessary agreements and documents associated with the grant for the Project, subject to approval by the City Attorney as to form, content, and legal sufficiency. If the City is awarded the grant, the City Council further authorizes the acceptance of a grant award from FDOT, the purchase of vehicles and/or equipment, the expenditure of grant funds, and the required cash match pursuant to the grant award.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Florida Department of Transportation's ("FDOT") District Six Office is soliciting applications for the Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) Section 5310 Program to provide capital and operating transportation funding to eligible agencies meeting the transportation needs of seniors, individuals with disabilities, and the disadvantaged. Under this solicitation of the FTA Section 5310 Program, agencies may apply to purchase new vehicles and equipment to expand services to older adults and people with disabilities. FDOT requires agencies to provide a ten-percent (10%) cash match for capital awards based on the Project's total cost.

Historically, government agencies were not eligible to apply for FTA Section 5310 Program funding. Therefore, the Rotary Club of Hialeah-Miami Springs partnered with the City to apply for and receive funding to purchase one (1) transit bus. The City uses this bus to transport individuals who attend the senior center. FDOT expanded eligible applicants to include government agencies during the current funding cycle. For this reason, the City desires to apply directly to FDOT for funding to purchase one (1) sixteen-passenger transit bus with two (2) wheelchair positions (the "Project"). The goal of the Project is to improve transportation services to the City's older adults.

In addition to the ten-percent (10%) cash match, the City will be responsible for the operation and maintenance of the bus. If awarded this grant, the city will have a total of three buses, two (2) co-owned by the City and the Rotary Club of Hialeah-Miami Springs while the new one will be strictly owned by the City. Per our contract with the Alliance of Aging, we are required to have a back up bus. The older 2011 bus, although with relatively low miles has significant mechanical/safety issues and is extremely unreliable. The newer of the two will continue to service our seniors for daily for pickup and drop-offs to the facility for lunches, filed trips and similar activities until the City is able to obtain the new bus at which time, one bus will become the backup in case one of the buses breaks down.

**WHEREAS**, the City desires to apply for and utilize available grant funding to purchase one (1) sixteen (16) passenger transit bus with two (2) wheelchair positions to improve transportation services for the City's older adults (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the City Manager recommends and the City Council desires to authorize executing and submitting a grant application and supporting documents and assurances to the FDOT for the purposes described herein and, if awarded the grant, that the City accept the grant award from the FDOT, purchase the vehicles and/or equipment

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is in receipt of your November 30<sup>th</sup> letter signed by the Mayors of the City of Miami Springs (City) and the Village of Virginia Gardens (Village) regarding the NW 36<sup>th</sup> Street Multimodal Planning Study (SR 948/NE 36<sup>th</sup> Street from SR 826/Palmetto Expressway to SR 5/US 1) and the "Iron Triangle" Urban Mobility Interchange Planning/Project Development and Environmental Studies (SR 953/NW 42<sup>nd</sup> Avenue with SR 948/NW 35<sup>th</sup> Street and SR 25/Okeechobee Road).

Given the recent feedback received, the Department will continue to evaluate potential solutions to improve mobility for all transportation modes along the NW 36<sup>th</sup> Street corridor. FDOT understands the City and Village's position on the proposed grade separated alternatives and will evaluate at-grade alternatives moving forward. FDOT will continue to coordinate with the City and the Village as the study progresses.

In addition to being of interest to the City of Hialeah, the "Iron Triangle" studies are included in the Miami-Dade County 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan. During the planning study process, there was support for the recommended concepts from the Project Advisory Group (PAG). The PAG was comprised of local government representations, regional stakeholders, and persons that live and work in the project area. In addition, recent discussions between FDOT and the City discussed moving forward into the Project Development and Environment study phase. During this phase a much more detailed evaluation of potential alternatives will occur, along with a more robust public engagement process.
