### Miami Springs opens its doors to a new way of traveling ... a bikesharing program.

It's simple as 1, 2, 3...You download the Spin app on your phone... "Spin Bikeshare", open the app, see which orange dot is closest to you (orange dot: bike), when you find a bike, press the scan button on the app, scan the QR code from behind the bike, and you are ready to ride! When you reach your final destination, lock the bike. Your time will stop upon locking it, and once you are ready to head back, you'll have to do it all over again. If the bike you used is no longer available, don't worry... all the bikes are equipped with a GPS system and the app locates every single bike from where you are standing that you can use on your trip back!

SPIN originated in San Francisco, California in 2016 and it is America's leading stationless bikeshare company. Their goal is "to transform cities and school campuses by offering an accessible, affordable, and environmentally friendly form of personal mobility."

**The Mayor's Message:** This isn't costing the city any money. It is a neutral deal where the company takes care of everything as far as picking up the bikes every night

For only \$1 for every half hour, it is a fun way to travel! There is also a membership for \$29 a month, which offers unlimited rides.

## Tax Season a Good Time to Purge Paper

Tax season is an annual reminder that we still have a lot of paper in our lives. Receipts, old tax returns, investment and insurance statements and other important papers can take up an inordinate amount of space in your home.

Since we are shuffling W-2s and itemizing expenses anyhow until April 15, now is a good time to make decisions on what to keep and what to relegate to the shredder. Try storing important documents online which are accessible anywhere there is an internet connection.

**Records to keep for one year** — Documents such as bank statements, credit cards bills, insurance policies that renew annually, pay stubs and monthly investment statements are examples of documents that are important, but they become obsolete when superseded by more current documents. Pay stubs should be kept until your W-2 is received once verified that the W-2 information matches your paystubs, shred the paystubs. Likewise, monthly investment statements should be kept until they can be reconciled with the annual statement.

**Records to Keep Until You Sell the House** —Some documents need to be saved for the life of the asset they correspond with. Annual investment statements should be kept until the account is closed. Loan documents, such as a mortgage or auto loan, should be saved until the asset is sold and



the loan paid off. Vehicle records, including receipts, title and registration, should be stored as long as you own the vehicle. After purchasing a large appliance, hold onto service contracts and warranty information until you no longer own the appliance.

**Records to keep for Seven Years** —

The IRS has a basic look-back review period of three years, but tax returns and supporting documents should be kept for a minimum of seven years. But you should scan each tax return to keep forever. This can come in handy when you need to look back at your past income, such as when you would like to verify the income-based Social Security contributions you made.

**Records to Keep for Life** — Birth certificates, marriage licenses, divorce decrees, Social Security cards, passports, and education records should all be kept in a safe place for life. The best places are fireproof boxes, safety deposit boxes or electronic files, in the event they need to be accessed while away from home. Additionally, permanent insurance policies, such as whole life insurance, need to be held onto for life along with estate planning documents including wills, trusts, and power of attorney documentation. If you have a pension, you should also keep the paperwork that details what pension option you selected. Protect yourself and your family by keeping good records, as well as the right ones.

**Welcoming the New Year**

It is the end of 2017 and we welcome the start of a New Year. The Building and Code Compliance Department would like to wish all Miami Springs residents, business owners and visitors a prosperous 2018.

The hurricane season ended November 30, 2017, but we have still noticed many properties with shutters and other protective devices still installed. It is time to remove all hurricane protection devices, let the sun shine in and enjoy some cool fresh air. The City of Miami Springs Municipal Code mandates that all hurricane protection devices be removed promptly after a hurricane warning and or hurricane season to provide an egress in the event of an emergency.

Effective January 2018 we will be performing a City Sweep to ensure that all hurricane protection devices have been removed.

**Sec. 93-13. Maintenance of property by owner.**

(C) Accordion shutters, window awnings, hurricane panels, plywood sheets, and other forms of storm protection devices that are utilized for the protection of windows and doors in anticipation of impending hurricanes and other storm systems may be closed, lowered, placed or installed no sooner than five (5) days prior to the time that the hurricane or storm system is anticipated to reach the City. However, upon proper notification to the Police Department that the property will be vacant for a specified period of time, the aforesaid storm protection devices may be closed, lowered, placed or installed for no longer than ninety (90) days during any calendar year. **Following the passage of the hurricane or storm system, and the return of the City to normal weather conditions, all Accordion shutters, window awnings, hurricane panels, plywood sheets, and other forms of storm protection devices shall be opened, raised or removed within**

**thirty (30) days thereof.** Any failure to comply with the foregoing shall be considered a violation of Section (A) above and enforced in accordance with the City's established Code enforcement procedures. It is the established policy of the City that the storm protection devices specified herein shall not be used as a method or means of providing security or crime prevention while the premises are being occupied.

**Water Restrictions**

- Watering is not allowed between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.
  - Hand-watering with one hose fitted with an automatic shut-off nozzle is allowed for 10 minutes per day for landscape stress relief and to prevent plant die-off.
  - Restrictions apply to all users of any water resource within Miami-Dade County, whether from publicly or privately owned water utility sewer systems, private wells or private connections to surface water bodies. Residents and businesses with an ODD-numbered street address (ending in 1, 3, 5, 7, 9):
    - Lawn watering is permitted on WEDNESDAYS and SATURDAYS from 4 p.m. to 10 a.m.
  - Residents and businesses with an EVEN-numbered street address (ending in 0, 2, 4, 6, 8\*), no street address, or who water both even and odd addresses within the same zones, including multi-family units and Homeowner Associations:
    - Lawn watering is permitted on THURSDAYS and SUNDAYS from 4 p.m. to 10 a.m.
- Residents should choose from one of two "watering windows" (before 10 a.m. or after 4 p.m.) on their designated irrigation days. For the most efficient use of water, residents should avoid irrigating during both time periods on the same day.

To report a water restriction violation, visit the 3-1-1.

**THE TRASH TALK CONTINUES**

Dear residents and property owners, there has been an excessive amount of trash and non-combustible materials being placed out on City swales multiple days prior to regular collection.

The Public Works Department along with Code Compliance are requesting the following City Codes be followed in order to keep our City clean:

- Garbage is to be placed in the containers, not on the ground
- Bulk trash is to be placed in your designated area
- Loose fly away trash shall be bagged
- Tree limbs should be cut to pieces no longer than three (3) feet
- Non-combustible material such as: concrete, appliances, tiles, metal, tires or other construction materials are to be disposed by the property owner at designated sites by Miami Dade Waste Management
- Recycle containers are to be brought in within 24 hours after pick up day
- Multi-Family buildings, commercial buildings and residential properties without alleys are to place their bulk trash out on their designated swale area only within 24 hours prior to pick up
- If an oversize amount of trash is to be placed on the swale area, contact Public Works for a special pick up. 305.805.5170
- Report illegal dumping to the Police Dept.

**Together we can all keep our City clean and Beautiful**

- **Sec. 93-05. - Garbage, garden trash, and rubbish; placement in receptacles for collection and removal; placement for pick-up and retrieval of containers.**

(A) Garbage shall be differentiated from garden trash and rubbish when placed in receptacles for collection, except in areas serviced by the automated collection system as noted in (C) below. Garbage collection and trash collection shall be separate or as otherwise di-

rected by the City Manager with limits as described in § 93-07.

(B) Garbage shall be placed in garbage cans, and accumulations of garden trash and rubbish deposits on the parkway and properties abutting existing alleys shall be placed in suitable containers or tied up in bundles in such manner that they will not litter the public right-of-way. Any tree limbs over one and one-half inches in diameter and any tree trunks or stumps shall be cut to a maximum length of three feet when placed for collection as herein defined for pickup by the public works department.

(C) Where the unit is serviced by the automated collection system, garbage, garden trash, and rubbish may be commingled for placement in the automated system container. Separate trash collection service will continue, and where the amount of garbage, garden trash, and rubbish shall exceed the capacity of the automated system container, the garden trash and rubbish shall be separately placed for collection, with limits as described in § 93-07.

(D) Loose trash, including bagged materials, white goods, furniture, and any other non-containerized or containerized trash materials may not be placed for pick up by any multi-family residential or commercial site adjacent to any City street earlier than 24 hours prior to any scheduled pick up. Any receptacles used for the disposal of these materials must be retrieved and returned to the interior of the site within 24 hours of pick up.

(E) In addition to the provision of subsection (D) above, all recycling containers may not be placed for pick up by any multi-family residential or commercial site adjacent to any City street earlier than 24 hours prior to any scheduled pick up. All recycling containers must be retrieved and returned to the interior of the property site within 24 hours of pick up.

(F) The provisions of subsections (D) and (E) above shall not be applicable to any pickups performed in City alleys and in the single family residentially zoned districts of the City.

**CONGREGATE MEALS:**

Hot lunch meals are served weekdays from 11:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. to assist area seniors in maintaining a nutritionally balanced diet and to provide opportunities to volunteer and socialize with their peers.

**TRANSPORTATION:**

Daily pick up, utilizing the Hialeah-MS Rotary Charitable Foundation bus, is provided to older residents with no means of transportation to and from the center.
